

- We should stand for the oppressed and against the oppressor.
- We should work against social hierarchies in our society and Christian organizations.
- If we have unjustly benefited from the racial hierarchy in the U.S., we must do our part to make it right.

# Partially Standing for Racial Justice

Secret stand- provides internal support.

Theoretical stand- provides verbal support but no action.

Selective stand-provides verbal and actual support in instances where significant sacrifices aren't needed.

Limited stand-provides verbal and actual support to certain causes or groups.

## Galatians 2:12-14


- 12 For before certain men came from James, he used to eat with the Gentiles. But when they arrived, he began to draw back and separate himself from the Gentiles because he was afraid of those who belonged to the circumcision group. 13 The other Jews joined him in his hypocrisy, so that by their hypocrisy even Barnabas was led astray.
- 14 When I saw that they were not acting in line with the truth of the gospel, I said to Cephas in front of them all, "You are a Jew, yet you live like a Gentile and not like a Jew. How is it, then, that you force Gentiles to follow Jewish customs?
